A PHYSICAL PRIDE MONTH & FESTIVAL WEEKEND IS IN FULL SWING FOR 2022

The Calgary Pride Parade and Festival 2022 - is free, accessible, and a culturally significant event for 2SLGBTQ+ folks and allies. The last in-person Parade & Festival in 2019 welcomed approximately 100,000 folks. Their goal in 2022 is to welcome 75,000-100,000 folks from Alberta and beyond to celebrate the diversity, experiences, and stories of the 2SLGBTQ+ community. A priority for Calgary Pride is to provide a paid opportunity to 2SLGBTQ+ artists and performers, with a focus on hiring performers from Alberta. Historically, approximately 60-70% of our performers have self-identified as racialized and/or trans and non-binary (from [TravelAlberta](#))

Fairy Tales Queer Film Fest

Friday, June 3rd @ 7 PM – *Neptune Frost*

From their camp in an otherworldly e-waste dump, they attempt a takeover of the authoritarian regime exploiting the region's natural resources – and its people. When an intersex runaway and an escaped coltan miner find each other through cosmic forces, their connection sparks glitches within the greater divine circuitry. Set between states of being – past and present, dream and waking life, colonized and free, male and female, memory and prescience – *Neptune Frost* is an invigorating and empowering direct download to the cerebral cortex and a call to reclaim technology for progressive political ends.

Friday, June 3 @ 9:30 PM – *My Emptiness and I with short Girls and the Party (*Adults Only*)*

Girls and the party: A group of girlfriends prepare for the anticipate summer party in a cramped bathroom. Between boy talk and makeup, Mercedes navigates her blossoming attraction for her friend Julia.
My Emptiness and I: Raphi is young, androgynous and naive. In Barcelona, she begins a gender transition as well as an arduous journey to find her true identity. Co-written by and starring Raphaëlle Pérez, this is the narrative follow-up to director Adrián Silvestre's ground-breaking hybrid doc *Sediments*, featuring many of the same trans performers and artists.

Saturday, June 4 @ 7 PM *Invisible: Gay Women in Southern Music*

Invisible: Gay Women in Southern Music: Growing up gay in the South is hard enough, but to be an openly gay woman in country music is nearly impossible. Nashville is a man's town, yet this group of gay women have persevered anyhow – making an indelible impact on country and southern music. This film explores their deeply personal journeys while taking a piercing look at family, religion and the patriarchy of country music.

Privilegiada: Olga and her close friend Dolores spend an afternoon at the municipal swimming pool rambling about gender differences and social impositions associated with women. These differences and injustices lead Olga to the conclusion that the privileges they supposedly once had as a "normative person" have completely disappeared and she is preparing to regain them. How? She doesn't even know it herself.
